- Our membership is up to 495 households, more than ever before in our history, during a time when the trend is declining membership at synagogues across the country.
- Financially, we remain strong. Your Board will present a balanced budget for the 2024-2025 fiscal year at our annual meeting on June 5. We are in a very fortunate position relative to many congregations around the country.
- Thanks to the generosity of many in our congregation, our endowments are growing, ensuring the long-term future financial security of our Temple family.
- This year, we installed a new state-of-the-art security system, which includes new cameras, alarms, a new key card system and more. All help to keep us safer when we are on campus.

- By the time you read this, we hope that our brand new Temple website will be online. This project, headed by our Executive Director, Shaun Copans, with a team of committed volunteers.

It is my goal for my second year as president, and my promise to you, to continue to reach for new milestones, and together with your entire Board of Directors, to ensure that Temple Emanu-El is, and continues to be, a home, a family, a warmth to tradition.

Helping to Repair the World

Your generous donations to Temple Emanu-El's Social Action Fund are used to serve the needs of the community, locally, nationally and internationally.

In May, funds were sent to Friends of Yad Sarah (friendsofyadsarah.org). Yad Sarah provides a range of services, including loan of durable medical equipment such as wheelchairs, hospital beds, and more in Israel for free or at nominal cost for sick, disabled and elderly people and their families. They provide day rehabilitation services, family violence intervention, transportation for those with special needs, emergency alarm response and much more. Founded in 1976 as a local initiative, they have grown to over 120 branches throughout the country and more than 7,000 volunteers. They are the largest volunteer organization in Israel, run by volunteers and supported by donations.

In June, we will allocate money to Direct Relief (directrelief.org), which is active in all 50 states and more than 80 countries, with a mission to improve the health and lives of people affected by poverty or emergencies. Its assistance programs focus on emergency preparedness and disaster response, and the prevention and treatment of disease. They work with local partners to provide medical aid following hurricanes, earthquakes and wildfires.

The Social Action Committee carefully screens all recipients to make sure money you donate to the Social Action Fund to continue the work of tikkun olam is spent wisely. We appreciate your donations, large or small, to help with this work.

Thank you for your donation in the aftermath of the October 7 Hamas attacks in Israel. Your generosity helped us to provide crucial medical equipment and supplies when it was needed most.

These funds were channeled to build an even more resilient Israel.

In the immediate aftermath of the attacks, 25 ambulances were airlifted to Israel to replace the 16 which were destroyed by Hamas. We obtained sponsorship for even more to increase our fleet. Funds for more than 98 first-responder motorcycles were also secured. We provided ballistic vests and helmets to protect EMT's and paramedics, as well as trauma kits and medical supplies to treat critically injured patients. Magen David Adom (MDA) will train at least two residents as EMT's in nearly every kibbutz in the south, in towns along the border and in settlements in Judea and Samaria. MDA will equip these communities with trauma kits and equipment to make them self-sufficient in the short term should they ever again find themselves under siege.

It's that time of year. "I'm bored," said the young boy.



What can you do to get rid of those symptoms? During the summer, we will continue have RI meetings each Thursday at 10 am in the Temple Library. There is no beginning and no end. The key is to just show up. You will get relief. It is a muscle memory method that has stood the test of time for 87 years. Dr. Abraham Low, our founder, believed that there were

no hopeless cases.

Here are some spots that can get you through summer upsets:

- -You might feel helpless but there are no hopeless cases.
- When we control our speech muscles, we have nothing to regret.
- We can move our muscles despite how we feel.
- It's distressing but not dangerous.
- We endorse for all of our efforts.
- We don't take the place of the professionals. We complement them.
- We don't give advice; we don't talk about medication the past, or the future.

Community Corner Regrets: How to Live with "If Only"

Have you ever said to yourself "if only?"

It is a rare person who can say they have no regrets. Every choice we make requires us to leave other choices behind. No matter how good a decision is, there may be those moments when you wonder what it would have been like if you had made a different one. Decisions are about trade offs.

Like most things in life, regret has an up side and a down side. It can be a humiliating and debilitating process, but it can also be a tool for learning. You can learn from your mistakes to move forward, maybe in a different direction.

One of the things that fuels regret is perfectionism that is based on the myth of the ideal life. We live in a culture that tells us we are entitled to be happy and fulfilled all the time, that we shouldn't be frustrated and should have most everything we want. More of everything is being flaunted in commercials, advertisements and magazines. Products become outdated almost as fast they come off the assembly line for something bigger and better. Your expectations and demands about what your life should be can magnify your regrets because regrets are always comparing what you have with what you think you need.

Dos and Don'ts of Regrets:

DOs:

Do normalize that we all make mistakes.

Do focus on what you can learn, not on what you did wrong. Do ask yourself what you were thinking when you made the mistake.

Do ask yourself what you were ignoring when you made the mistake.

Do ask yourself how you can use the information you have gathered.

Do ask yourself how you can avoid this mistake in the future.

DON'Ts:

Don't look back on your life and think of how much better off you would have been if you had done something

Don't dwell on all the negatives that you experienced and discount all the positives.

Don't idealize the choices that you did not make.

Don't insist that you should have known better.

Don't criticize yourself for not having known better.

Don't measure your choices by the best outcome that you can imagine.

Don't insist that you need to know everything before making

a decision.

Don't expect a free lunch. Every decision involves some uncertainty and compromise.

Reflection: You don't have to make decisions based on avoiding regret or by pursuing the perfect answer. Living in the real world requires compromise and settling for less than perfect.

Today's Practice: Recall a decision you made in your life where you had regret, but after a while you found the good that came from it.



Safety Reminders by Greg Houska, Safety/Security Committee Chair

This month, we return to awareness of safety and preparation for crisis, which is a concern for most of us. Unfortunately, our world continues to be a very troubled place. Hopefully things will return to some semblance of normality soon and people may focus on seeking employment or concentrating on combating injustice. But until then, I offer some friendly reminders to help keep you safe.

- "See something, say something" is not just some catchy phrase. If something doesn't seem right, bring it to the attention of the authorities. It's better to say something and be wrong, than say nothing and have something bad happen.
- Be a good witness. Take photos; write down license plates and descriptions of subjects. Being able to provide details on vehicles, details on a person's features, including race, height, age, type and color of clothing, and anything else you note are very helpful in identifying subjects.
- Watch or re-watch the FBI video "Run, Hide, Fight." Always be aware of your surroundings and identify the locations of the exit doors. Plan what you will do if something bad happens.
- For heaven's sake, put your cell phone down! Nothing you are reading or watching is that important. Also, I know listening to music via earbuds is a convenient and entertaining part of your day but consider only utilizing only one of them so you can be attuned to what is going on around you. If you run or hike in secluded areas, wearing earbuds makes you very vulnerable to an attack.
- Keep up on your first aid skills. Everyone should have a kit in their vehicle or home with at least the basics: bandages, gauze pads, a one-way valve mask, and a tourniquet. Know how to use everything. It is your obligation to know how to do CPR. Take a CPR class.
- Remember the saying, "When seconds matter, law enforcement is minutes away." We must all be prepared for the worst to happen. The FBI has put out repeated warnings that an attack on our homeland is imminent. I would never talk someone into purchasing a firearm, but if you are considering it, please do so with the understanding that owning a firearm is a huge responsibility and a huge liability. This is mitigated with proper training and common sense. There are many organizations that provide firearms training, including "Guns and Moses," which, as the name says, helps the Jewish community with gun safety and familiarity.




