# Mitzvah of the Month — Non-perishable food for High Holy Day Food Drive



Each year, the Social Action Committee coordinates Temple Emanu-El's collection of non-perishable food and grocery store gift cards to be donated to the Jewish

Family Service Hand Up Food Pantry. Though many congregations hold food drives during the High Holy Days, Temple Emanu-El often collects more than all other congregations combined.

Most needed items this year are canned food, including soups, fruit, vegetables, beans, peanut butter or other nut butters, and high protein items such as canned tuna and canned chicken. Also welcome are pasta, rice, oatmeal, breakfast cereal, cake mixes, and dehydrated mashed potatoes. Please – no glass jars.

We should all have food set aside in our homes to be used in case of any emergency or natural disaster. Yom Kippur is a perfect time to donate unexpired cans or packages of food, and to replace them with fresher items.

Grocery bags will be given out following Rosh Hashanah services and will be available in the Sanctuary lobby during the holidays. You may bring your donation any time when you come for any of the Yom Kippur services. If you plan to be out of town, to livestream the services, or if it is more convenient, you may drop off your

donations at any time during October in the lobby of the Temple's office building. If you prefer, you may bring or mail gift cards from a local store, or donate to the Social Action Fund, and designate the donation for the High Holy Day Food Drive.

We appreciate your support for San Diegans facing food insecurity.





# Helping to Repair the World

Your generous donations to Temple Emanu-El's Social Action Fund are used to serve the needs of the community, locally, nationally and internationally.

In September, funds were sent to Feeding America San Diego (feedingsandiego.org). Feeding San Diego was established in 2007, and is currently the leading hunger relief and food rescue organization in San Diego County. More than 35% of food produced in the U.S. goes to waste each year. Feeding America rescues nutritious surplus food from groceries, retailers, farms, restaurants and more. They provide outreach to vulnerable clients who are likely to have uncertain or limited access to food and also help to enroll those eligible in California's food stamp program.

In October, we will allocate money to the National Alliance on Mental Illness (namisandiego.org), the community's voice on mental illness in San Diego and Imperial Counties. Its mission includes supporting people with mental illnesses and their families by helping them find coping mechanisms for their daily struggle with brain disorders; educating people who have mental illness, their families, and the general public about mental illness with the goal of dispelling ignorance and stigma; and advocating for more research and an improved system of mental health services across the nation.

The Social Action Committee carefully screens all recipients to make sure money you donate to the Social Action Fund to continue the work of tikkun olam is spent wisely. We appreciate your donations, large or small, to help with this work.

# Israel Engagement — Arts and Culture

Israel Engagement members met with Rabbi Devorah in September to plan programming for the upcoming year. Over dinner, we discussed our current concerns about the situation in Israel and talked from our hearts on our relationships to Israel. We read and discussed a blog post from Hartman Institute scholar Yossi Klein Halevi, who wrote about angst and the changing views he shares with many Israelis since October 7. The tensions we feel are shared by our fellow Jews in diaspora and in Israel. This anguish, worry and criticism often reflect our commitment to strengthening community and connections.

### Please note our upcoming events:

- On Yom Kippur Day Limmud Study, Rabbi Devorah will engage the congregation in processing what is happening in Israel and to discern responsibilities, relationships, and roles as members of the Jewish diaspora. Limmud study on Saturday, October 12, will begin at 1:30 pm, following the morning service. Please plan your Yom Kippur to include participating.
- On Saturday, November 9, we will be a co-sponsor of an exceptional opportunity brought to San Diego by J Street. We will bring together Israeli policy expert Dr. Dahlia Scheindlin and Palestinian public opinion and polling expert Dr. Khalil Shikaki for a conversation. They will examine public opinion within Israeli and Palestinian societies and explore possibilities for a path forward. Each speaker is remarkable individually, but what makes this event truly unique is the opportunity to hear them engage in dialogue. Details are still being worked out, but please make a note now in your calendar, and watch the weekly Temple emails or contact us for location and time.
- Our next meeting will be held on Thursday, November 14, at 6 pm on Zoom. Please contact us to register and we will send the Zoom link. For over twenty years, the Sisterhood has supported graduating high school seniors in our Temple community by providing a select number of students with scholarships that partially fund their college education. The Sisterhood raises money for these scholarships in several ways: through direct donations, fundraising events, and by allocating funds from our annual budget. Our principal fundraiser is the Artisan Festival, held on the first Sunday of November. The Festival showcases local artists who bring their wares and sell them to attendees. We raise money from table fees paid by the artists, through a raffle of items donated by the artists, and through a gift card auction.

Historically, we have been able to generate approximately \$5,000 annually, which enables us to award multiple scholarships. We know, however, that this coming year we will have an unusually large graduating class. That, coupled with the rising costs of college, has inspired us to set a goal of raising \$10,000. To achieve this goal, we are looking for individuals and businesses willing to help sponsor our Artisan Festival. Sponsors will be recognized in all advertising for the Festival, which includes social media postings, our Temple bulletin, flyers that will reach 500 families in our congregation, and posters that appear in stores and libraries in the surrounding communities. ## Kidnapped: The Abduction of Edgardo Mortara

Saturday, October 5, 7 pm Temple Sanctuary



In 1858, Vatican officials arrived at the house of the Jewish Mortara family in Bologna and informed them that their six -year-old son Edgardo had been secretly baptized by his Catholic nanny when he had been ill and therefore could not live with them. Edgardo is taken from the Mortaras and raised as a Catholic by the Church. The circumstances of the baptism—whether it occurred, whether it counted, why it came to light when it did—are just the tip of the iceberg of matters that Edgardo's father confronts while navigating papal and government politics and how the press covered the story. The case became an international flashpoint.

The movie, directed by Marco Bellocchio, was made in Italy in 2023.

Laurie Baron will introduce the film and facilitate a discussion after it is screened.

### Drum Circle—Tuesday, October 1, 3 pm

A Community Drum Circle is a collaborative, self-organized musical event created "in the moment" by all the people who participate. When we, as a community, led by our devoted and talented leader, Ira Moskowitz, drum together, we share our spirit in the form of different rhythms. It changes our relationship for the positive.

Ira researches the rhythms we try out and is patient with us as we follow along, experimenting with the beats. He leads us in warm-up exercises by stretching, opening and closing our hands, and making our fingers take flight. Michelle Jirkovsky, our Temple Music Director, brings her own talent to the group.

We are getting to know one another, share stories and share with each other about how certain beats are tricky to follow. In part, we reduce social isolation and feelings of stress or anxiety.

To participate you do not have to have a drum, but if you do, bring along a Djembe, Dumbec Style or Buffalo Drum. Ira always brings his Tom Tom which different people have fun using. It keeps a metronome beat which provides a base rhythm.

The only requirements for participation are a willingness to express your own personal rhythm, sensing the spirit of transformation, experiencing that drumming is very forgiving and a willingness to have fun! Throughout we follow each other's rhythms and create unique ones. Unlike playing traditional musical instruments, you do not need the ability to read notes to be part of a drum circle.

We meet on the first Tuesday of each month, at 3 pm, inside the building when it is very hot, outside when we can. You can come and participate, lead, observe, listen or sway with a waltz-like rhythm. Everyone is welcome – you do not need to be a Temple member. Afterward we stayed on to kibbitz, forming a partnership and ending with "rumbling," which is a loud and syncopated beat.

Join us next month on Tuesday, October 1 at 3 pm, right before the New Year. You might just get hooked on coming again in November!

# Community Corner Changing Habits: Think Small

Whether you realize it or not, a lot of your daily behavior is composed of habits. These are automatic behaviors that you do without thinking. You do them in the same way every day. From the moment we open our eyes in the morning, get out of bed, brush our teeth, take a shower, or fix breakfast, we are running on habits.

According to researchers, we can get remarkable results by making one tiny change at a time.

Simplicity changes behavior. When a behavior is easy to do, it doesn't require lots of motivation. Weeding your garden for two minutes requires less motivation than weeding for five hours. Cleaning and putting away a few dishes is easier than cleaning the whole kitchen. Motivation is not reliable. It shifts day by day, even minute by minute.

Here are a few ideas for building habits you want and getting them to work for you:

- 1. What makes you come alive or fills your heart with joy? Look for a habit that would do just that.
- 2. Stay engaged in this new habit. Our brains LOVE novelty. "Wake up" out of your old habitual programming.
- 3. Create an attitude of gratitude. If you look at changing a habit as something you are grateful for, you have more reason to do it.
- 4. Connect with your purpose. "Why am I doing this?" Look at the big picture and remember the reason you want this new habit.
- 5. It's the little things that count. "It's the little details that are vital. Little things make big things happen."

- B.J. Fogg, a Stanford University professor, created a method for designing new habits. He calls it a recipe and it has three parts:
  - Part 1—After 1... You connect an already existing routine in your life that will remind you to do the new habit.
  - **Part 2—I will...** The new habit you want and make is super tiny and super easy.
  - Part 3—Then celebrate! Something you do to create a positive feeling inside yourself, like a big smile, clap your hands, do a fist pump, give yourself a thumbs up, tell yourself "good job."

Here are several examples:

After you brush your teeth, don't snack anymore. Clap your hands. After you notice you are feeling stressed, take a few deep breaths. Then congratulate yourself

After you hear your alarm in the morning, get up without hitting snooze. Then smile.

When you feel successful you'll want to do that habit again.

# Safety/Security Committee by Greg Houska, Safety/Security Committee Chair

I hope my timing is spot on as I wish all of you a Happy New Year! Please take the below advisement with a drop of honey:

**Honey Jar Handling**: When dipping your apple in honey, remember that less is more—both for your waistline and your kitchen floor. That sticky situation can be a real buzzkill!
