


אבות

The אָבוֹת is the first blessing of the Amidah—a group of blessings at the heart of every prayer service. It asks God to recognize us as descendants of our ancestors Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, and it links each of us to the family of Abraham and Sarah. It asks God to watch over us, protect us, and bless us, just as God watched over our ancestors.

In the Avot we recognize that God is mighty, powerful, and awesome, but also loving and protective. You can see this balance in your everyday life, too—your mom might be strict about you doing your homework, but she can also be loving and supportive when she helps you with it and praises you when you do well.

An Ethical Echo

An important part of the אָבוֹת אָבוֹת blessing is the belief in אָבוֹת "the merit of the ancestors"—which means that we are favored with God's love and care because of the goodness of our ancestors. We have inherited the gift of God's generosity, kindness, and protection because of their faith and their righteousness.

Think About This!

Do you think that אָבוֹת אָבוֹת אָבוֹת is enough by itself to grant us God's care and love, or do we also need to *earn* those rewards? If you've ever seen a lightning storm, you've witnessed God's power in nature. And if you've watched the first leaves bloom on your favorite backyard tree after a long, cold winter, you've observed God's power to give and sustain life.

The second blessing of the Amidah is called אָבוּרוֹת ("powers"). In it, we praise God's awesome powers. These powers are evidence of God's greatness—the same greatness that gives us life and the strength to make the world a better place.





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קרוּשָׁה

Have you ever imagined that you were someone else? Perhaps you had the role of a princess in a school play and you spoke and walked regally. Or maybe you and your buddies pretended to be pro-basketball stars. The קרוֹשָׁה, the third blessing in the Amidah, helps us stretch our imaginations so we can picture angels as they praise God.

The Torah tells us in the Book of Isaiah that winged angels praised God with the words of the Kedushah (*kadosh, kadosh, kadosh*). We are like angels when we

say these words—we rise up on our toes three times and we imagine that we are elevating ourselves in the same way that the angels are elevated in God's eyes. *Kedushah* means "holy," and in this—the central blessing in the Amidah—we express our awe at God's holiness.

When we say these words, we try to focus on being kinder and more patient, more helpful and more thoughtful. In this way, the Kedushah helps us concentrate on becoming better people.



If you've ever made a wish while blowing away a fuzzy dandelion or throwing pennies in a fountain, you know that there are many things you can wish for. But if you had just one wish, what would it be? Maybe you'd wish for a puppy. Or maybe you'd wish you could be the star of your soccer team. Or

maybe you'd even wish you were taller or had curly hair or knew how to play a musical instrument.

When the Jewish people make a wish as a community, it is a wish for peace. The idea of peace is so important to the Jews that the final blessing of the Amidah is a prayer for peace.

During the evening service, this blessing begins with the words שָׁלוֹם רָב ("great peace"). In it, we ask God for peace in the world at all times. In the morning, we recite the same blessing, but it begins with a passage called שִׁים שָׁלוֹם ("grant peace"), which you will study later in this chapter.

Do you have something precious that you protect or guard? Maybe it's a diary where you write down your secret thoughts and wishes, kept hidden under your pillow. Or maybe you have a bike you received as a birthday present, that you keep safe with a lock during school hours.

In a similar way, the Jewish people consider Shabbat to be sacred, and guard it as a gift from God. לְשָׁרְרוֹ ("and [you] shall keep" or "and [you] shall guard") comes from the Torah, and reminds us of our promise to God to guard, cherish, and observe Shabbat and keep it holy. V'shamru is said before the Amidah during the Friday night service. In reciting it, we declare that we are guarding Shabbat because it is God's special creation—and we remember that by celebrating Shabbat we are strengthening our ties to God.


