

Community Corner Why Community Matters

There's a special kind of joy that happens in groups. We find our greatest times of happiness in moments of *collective effervescence*. It's a concept coined by the sociologist Emile Durkheim to describe the sense of energy and harmony people feel when they come together in a group around a shared purpose.

Human beings aren't meant to be alone. Community is critical to our health and wellbeing.

The happiest times of our lives are not usually spent in isolation but among friends, family and loved ones. We treasure life's most precious moments together at special ceremonies like weddings, Bar and Bat Mitzvahs, holidays, festivals and birthdays.

Equally, when times are hard, so too do we find encouragement, hope and optimism in the support of others. That is why support groups are so important.

As lockdowns and social distancing became the norm, there were fewer and fewer of these moments. Now that things have improved, many people are having a hard time reconnecting.

In cultures where they pursue happiness socially, through connecting, caring and contributing, people appear to be more likely to gain well-being.

It's normal to be nervous or even feel guilty about reconnecting especially when we are bombarded with new subvariants that are highly contagious.

So how do we relearn how to be together? Here are some ideas:

- Give yourself permission to set small, achievable goals.
- Balance your need to be around people with your need to protect your health.
- Accept that certain activities may be tough for a while: flying, sporting events, traveling.
- Reach out to someone you've lost touch with.
- Participate at the level you are comfortable with.

Communities are meaningful and beneficial to our wellbeing. They provide support, safety, connection belonging, shared activities and ideas, and strong bonds.

We are craving community and cannot live our best lives without it. Our mental and physical health literally depend on being part of strong and capable communities.

Reflection: Remind yourself how much you matter and consider the ways you can strengthen and sustain yourself in community.

Today's Practice: Recall the times community has sustained you and you have sustained them.

Israel Engagement: The Origins of our Hebrew Language

Our first two articles dealt with current Israeli politics. The proposed changes suggested by the new government are generating controversy, diplomatic engagements and protests that take place weekly in Israel. There is no lack of articles and opinion pieces in U.S., international and Israeli newspapers for all of us to follow the situation.

In the meantime, we came across a fascinating article written by Ofer Aderet, and published in the January 20, 2023 issue of *Haaretz* concerning the origins of our Hebrew language.

Ancient Amorite-Akkadian tablets were discovered in Iraq about 30 years ago, possibly during the Iran-Iraq War. They were among thousands of artifacts taken to a safe place overseas. In 2016, Manfred Krebernik and Andrew R. George, famous archeologists with linguistic expertise in the languages of ancient Mesopotamia, began their study of these tablets and recently published their findings. The clay tablets, covered from top to bottom in cuneiform writing, contain details of a Canaanite language that has remarkable similarities with our ancient Hebrew language.


The tablets are 3800 years old and have been dated to the era of Babylonian King Hammurabi, 1800 B.C.E. The text on the tablets is divided into two parts. Like the famous Rosetta Stone, which had an inscription in one known language (ancient Greek) in parallel with two unknown written ancient Egyptian scripts (hieroglyphics and demotic). On one side, phrases, words and complete sentences are inscribed by the Amorite tribes originally from Canaan, the area that's roughly now Syria, Israel, and Jordan. On the other side the phrases, words and complete sentences are translated into Akkadian. Akkadian is a language well known and can be read by modern scholars.

Professor Yoram Cohen of Tel Aviv University Archeology Department said, "In this text, which is very, very ancient, words appear that anyone who knows Hebrew will immediately recognize. You don't have to be a linguist to understand the connection to Hebrew. Basically, we're looking at our forefathers here." Prior to the Hebrew language, language was spoken which was very close to ancient Hebrew. Some of the Amorite words that resemble Hebrew closely are "hashulan, lehem, le'eli" meaning the table, bread, my god. This discovery helps us understand the beginning of ancient spoken Hebrew.

According to the Tanach, the Amorites are one of nations that lived in Canaan at the time it was conquered by Joshua and the tribes. It appears that some of their language conquered us.

Then travel in time to 1891, when Eliezer Ben Yehuda arrived in Palestine and began to revive the Biblical Hebrew into the modern spoken Hebrew which we use today.

Now approximately nine million people speak Hebrew.



Helping to Repair the World

Your generous donations to Temple Emanu-El's Social Action Fund are used to serve the needs of the community, locally, nationally and internationally.

In February, funds were sent to the Jacobs and Cushman San Diego Food Bank (sandiegofoodbank.org), the largest hunger relief organization in San Diego County. Last year, the organization distributed 63 million pounds of food. Of San Diego County's 3.3 million residents, over 1 million people face nutritional insecurity. On average, the Food Bank (operating in San Diego and their North County branch in Vista) serves 500,000 people per month in the county and partners with 500 non-profits, including food pantries, soup kitchens, senior centers, shelters and day care centers. They also provide immediate, confidential food assistance in emergencies through their association with 2-1-1 San Diego, a major resource and referral agency.

In addition, a special contribution was sent to Global Giving (globalgiving.org) following the devastating earthquake in Turkey and Syria. Funds will be used immediately for emergency relief, including shelter and food, and for long term recovery after urgent needs are met. Global Giving also partners with local nonprofits which can close gaps in response and recovery efforts.

In March, we will allocate money to the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice (rcrc.org). Founded in 1974, this interfaith organization works to remove multiple barriers which impede people, especially those in marginalized communities, to access reproductive health care with respect and dignity. They bring the moral force of religion to protect justice through education and advocacy.

The Social Action Committee carefully screens all recipients to make sure money you donate to the Social Action Fund to continue the work of tikkun olam is spent wisely. We appreciate your donations, large or small, to help with this work.

Yard Safety Tips

I can't say that spring is in the air, but it is certainly on the horizon. In order to get ready for it, let's discuss some things we should consider prior to entering the garden. But first, please remember that starting your own garden is easy, but picking all the vegetables is the harvest part!

- 1. Invest in the right equipment: a good pair of gloves, eye protection and sturdy, slip-resistant shoes or boots are all a must.
- 2. Use leverage or get some help lifting heavy items such as bags of fertilizer or large plants. A small wheelbarrow or hand truck will make your job a lot easier.
- 3. Stay hydrated. Wear comfortable clothing, including a hat, and don't forget the sunscreen.
- 4. Familiarize yourself with power tools and make sure extension cords are in good shape with no cuts or loose wires. Power tools should be in the "off" position before starting them. Ensure ladders are set on a firm and level surface and wear a tool belt to hold, well, your tools.
- 5. If by some chance you are stung by a bee or other insect, immediately remove any jewelry near the affected appendage. This will prevent it from having to be cut off if a finger or hand swells.

Just remember, growing a vegetable or herb garden can be tough, but if you put thought and effort into planning, you will find thyme for it.
