Next Group Meeting on Zoom: Monday, May 15, 7 pm

Our May book is "All Who Go Do Not Return" by Shulem Deen. The book was the National Jewish Book Winner in 2015. It is a moving and revealing exploration of Hasidic life, and one man's struggles with faith, family, and community. Shulem Deen's memoir, *All Who Go Do Not Return*, succeeds in explaining one man's harrowing battle against faith. Deen is the creator of Unpious, an online journal for "voices on the Hasidic fringe." His narrative flows beautifully on the page, especially considering that he grew up in a Yiddish-speaking household. In telling his tale, Deen understands the importance of playing devil's advocate and thinking carefully about what others believe during tense moments. His handbook on a Hasid's struggles contains one



surprise after another. Only someone who has been expelled from a community could recount so vividly and viscerally what sort of pain comes with this type of substantial loss, and Deen loses more than you might think. His memoir keeps the reader glued to the page from beginning to end—and by providing thorough, concise explanations of concepts, readers may find foreign, he makes it unnecessary to have Wikipedia nearby. *All Who Go Do Not Return* is intended not only for Jewish readers, but for all who want to see the world through Deen's clear eyes. He is a curious individual who finds everything intriguing. Those who long to be accepted, who have felt lost, should pick up this book. This s a book for the nomad, the explorer, the insatiable.

Community Corner The Wisdom of Making Mistakes

"Resilience begins with failure." This is not a mindset we generally choose to cultivate but it has a truth of its own. When you think about it, a lot of our growth comes from having made mistakes.

Great inventions were realized after mistakes. There is growing evidence to suggest that innovation flourishes when people are given the space to make mistakes.

Way back and many decades ago, I was an undirected, confused, insecure young woman. I entered San Diego State University and didn't know what I wanted or was interested in. Yes, it was a recipe for failure, and I did. I flunked out of college.

Flash forward. When my three daughters were ages ten months, two and three years, I made a decision to go back to school. I was deeply sorry I had not finished college, embarrassed I had flunked out, and very determined to complete a degree. Slowly, one class at a time, I earned an undergraduate degree and later a master's degree. The fire in my belly was lit by failure. During my time in school, I figured out what I felt passionate about, what I wanted and how I could be useful to others. I have been doing just that for over three decades.

I don't know about your life, but my life has not been linear and doesn't travel in a straight line. It zigzags, detours and doubles back. Many things I have to learn over and over again.

Here are just a few of the lessons we can learn from mistakes:

- 1. We learn the lesson of humility. We aren't perfect and neither is anyone else. We learn to be compassionate to ourselves and others.
- 2. We learn the lesson of change. Much of who we think we are can get swept away when confronted with our own mistakes.
- 3. We learn the lesson of authenticity. We can be more real and authentic by accepting that we have limits as well as assets.
- 4. We learn the lesson of surrender. Surrender happens when our usual ways of controlling life no longer work, and it is too exhausting to attempt to persist in trying to control the uncontrollable.

Reflection: Reflect on how mistakes can help you discover inner strength.



Cinematic Jewish Calendar Movie Series A Film for Yom HaAtzmaut, Israel Independence Day *A Tale of Love and Darkness* Saturday, May 20, 7 pm Temple Sanctuary, In Person



Natalie Portman debuts as a feature writer/director by deftly and strikingly adapting the family memoir of Amos Oz, one of Israel's most prominent writers and intellectuals. She warmly hones this portrait of a storyteller as a young man through his childishly humorous view of the turbulent 1940s in Jerusalem. Beyond nostalgia, Portman plays the author's mother, Fania, who was the heart of his autobiography. As an adult, he tries to understand her influence and why she committed suicide at age 38, when he was only 12. All this unfolds amidst the background of remembering relatives who died in the Holocaust, the creation of Israel, and the process of becoming an Israeli. Achieving both a literary and painterly feel, Portman's stereotype-free portrayal of Jewish families in Jerusalem in this period is a tribute to the great writer and his muse. The movie, made in 2015, was filmed in Israel and the United States.

In these troubled times, we would like to share a prayer for Israel adapted and written by Alan Elsner. Elsner is a former global correspondent for The Jerusalem Post and Reuters, communications person for The Israel Project and J Street, novelist and playwright.

Alternative Prayer for the State of Israel

We pray for our beloved Israel, invoking these words from its Declaration of Independence:

"The State of Israel will be open for Jewish immigration and for the Ingathering of the Exiles; it will foster the development of the country for the benefit of all its inhabitants; it will be based on freedom, justice and peace as envisaged by the prophets of Israel; it will ensure complete equality of social and political rights to all its inhabitants irrespective of religion, race or sex; it will guarantee freedom of religion, conscience, language, education and culture; it will safeguard the Holy Places of all religions; and it will be faithful to the principles of the Charter of the United Nations."

Let us pray that these words will continue to guide Israel's leaders and its people, that the Jewish state will be inclusive, promoting the unity and embracing the full, glorious diversity of the Jewish people. Let us never forget that our history teaches us to stand with the oppressed around the world. Strengthen the hands of those who defend Israel's borders, its security and its democracy and uphold a government which enshrines the principles of equal justice and moral accountability. Let Israel foster the generosity of spirit to share the land in peace with others whose home it is. May Israel remain a place where the still, small voice is heard. Let its leaders resist the temptation to believe that might makes right.

Advocacy—We did it!

Unfortunately, a little over a year ago when we met with elected officials, we had to include antisemitism as one of the issues we advocated about. During a meeting with then Supervisor Nathan Fletcher, he suggested taking a public stand with a Board of Supervisor Resolution against antisemitism. We went to work to make that happen. Rabbi Devorah and Rabbi Ridberg of Congregation Dor Hadash took a draft resolution created by members of the Advocacy Committee and turned it into a powerful resolution. Committee member Pat Libby shepherded the resolution through much of the Jewish community for their approval. Organizations signing on included the San Diego Rabbinical Association, Jewish Federation, ADL and Jewish Family Service. The Resolution was presented at the March 14 Board of Supervisor's meeting, co-sponsored by Nathan Fletcher and Terra Lawson-Remer. The Resolution passed unanimously. Here it is:

Meeting Date: March 14, 2023

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF SAN DIEGO DENOUNCING ANTISEMITIC RHETORIC AND HATE CRIMES TOWARDS JEWISH PEOPLE IN SAN DIEGO COUNTY.

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors supports creating inclusive and accepting communities for all residents of San Diego; and

WHEREAS, the County of San Diego is home to tens of thousands Jewish people; and

WHEREAS, the Jewish people have maintained a unique ethnic, religious, social, and cultural identity, and diverse ethnic history for more than 5,000 years, and

WHEREAS, Jewish peoplehood is reflected in a diverse and multifaceted reality that spans continents, wide-ranging religious expressions, political attitudes, ethnic cultures, and is bound by a spiritual and historical attachment to the Land of Israel; and

WHEREAS, calls for the destruction of Israel along with, anti-Jewish, and antisemitic, bullying, vandalism, heated rhetoric, physical assaults, and violence have been on the rise in recent years; and

WHEREAS, in 2019 an armed gunman opened fire in a San Diego County synagogue during services resulting in one death and multiple injuries; and

WHEREAS, in 2020 the Federal Bureau of Investigation reported a 6 percent increase in hate crimes from the previous year, representing the highest total in 12 years, and found that attacks against Jews or Jewish institutions made up nearly 60 percent of all religious-based hate crimes; and

WHEREAS, in 2021, the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) tabulated 2,717 antisemitic incidents in the United States, a 34 percent increase from the 2,026 incidents tabulated in 2020, and the highest number on record since the ADL began tracking incidents in 1979; and

WHEREAS, no individual or group within San Diego County should be a target of discrimination, or fear retaliation, derision, bullying, isolation, or violence because of their identity; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors denounces the rise in antisemitic rhetoric and hate-motivated crimes and incidents that denigrate Jewish people in the County of San Diego.

Women of Temple Emanu-El



Rabbi Devorah always says, "You've been voluntold" when she asks someone to do a task. Back on a Temple Emanu-El cold January day in 1913, H. Walter Friberg convened a meeting of about 100 women from all over the United States in Cincinnati, Ohio. They had traveled by train from places as far away as San Diego. He asked them to form a woman's support organization to aid in the work of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (UAHC). His vision was that the women could strengthen the congregations if they were formally organized into a national group. In January 1913, the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods (NFTS) was formed. Now fast forward 113 years to today. NFTS is now the Women of Reform Judaism (WRJ) and the UAHC is now the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ). And what of our Mission to support the congregations? That remains unchanged. WRJ exists within each individual congregation to help strengthen the congregation.

What does WRJ do here at Temple Emanu-El? We support the Torah School and Preschool Fundraisers. We support the Purim Carnival. We provide Fun-raisers. This year we had a great Chanukah Latke Tasting and a Bingo Night. We had a super fun Bunco Night. We had a delicious Taste of Passover, and every participant went home with a recipe book. We helped with the Passover Seder. We sponsor the Artisan Festival, which raises money for post high school scholarships granted to graduating seniors. We sponsor the annual Honey from the Heart program that lets you send a beautiful jar of honey to your family and friends at Rosh HaShanah. We organize groups for Theater Nights. We are planning Sisterhood Shabbat, this year to be held on May 19.

What do we want to do? We want to offer more fun-raisers. We want to start a Mah Jongg group to play weekly. We are planning a summer daytime Bunco game. We are planning another Theater Night to see R E S P E C T at Lamb's Theater. We are looking at more "Taste of" programs. Are you interested in any of these ideas? If so, please join (or rejoin) Women of Temple Emanu-El next month. We value you and your membership as well as your suggestions. Without you, we are one member short! WRJ was founded 113 years ago. We continue to grow and evolve as a women's organization. Many sisterhoods have men who join as Associate Members to help support the work we do. The issues we work on today are far more complex than issues from 113 years ago, but we stand on the shoulders of those early members of our organization with gratitude, and great admiration for their vision. Today WRJ is establishing a Social Justice Fund to fight issues of inequality in all areas of life. We are fighting the war attacking a woman's right to choose. We are battling for pay equity. And additionally, we are supporting the Temples that are the core of our existence! We encourage you to be voluntold and join us a Member of Women of Temple Emanu-El.







Helping to Repair the World

Your generous donations to Temple Emanu-El's Social Action Fund are used to serve the needs of the community, locally, nationally, and internationally.

In April, funds were sent to the San Diego Volunteer Lawyer Project (sdvlp.org), the county's oldest and most comprehensive pro bono legal services program for low-income individuals, non-profit community organizations and others. SDVLP's goal is that all people enjoy equal justice and access to legal services without regard to economic status. They serve the most vulnerable members of our community, including the homeless. abused children, domestic violence victims, veterans, immigrants, those with HIV/AIDS, and elder abuse victims. More than 75% of their clients are women.

In May, we will allocate money to the World Jewish Congress (worldjewishcongress.org), which began in 1936 in response to the growing anti-Semitism across Europe. They are now active in 100 countries, representing Jewish communities and organizations. They work to ensure the continuity and development of religious, spiritual, cultural, and social heritage of the Jewish people, and act on behalf of the Jewish people as a whole with international organizations, governments and interfaith groups. Our donation will be earmarked for their work on combating anti-Semitism and raising consciousness to the dangers inherent in incitement to religious, racial, or ethnic intolerance and persecution.

The Social Action Committee carefully screens all recipients to make sure money you donate to the Social Action Fund to continue the work of tikkun olam is spent wisely. We appreciate your donations, large or small, to help with this work.


