- Our membership is up to 495 households, more than ever before in our history, during a time when the trend at synagogues across the country is declining membership.
- Financially we remain strong. Today we are presenting a balanced budget for the 2024-2025 fiscal year. We are in a very fortunate position relative to many congregations around the country.
- Thanks to the generosity of many in our congregation, our endowments are growing, ensuring the long-term future financial security of our Temple family.

- Hopefully by the time this report is distributed, our brand new Temple website will be online. This project was headed by our executive director Shaun Copans and a team of committed volunteers.
- Finally, I initiated a process of board development at our annual board retreat last February. The intention is for this process to continue moving forward, ensuring your board of directors is working together in a professional and committed way towards maintaining our current strong fiscal position, and that we continue to be the finest reform congregation in San Diego.

I want to thank Rabbi Marcus and Rabbi Benj for their commitment to the spiritual life of our congregation and their wonderful pastoral care. We are all better because of them.

I am especially grateful to Shaun Copans for his exceptional leadership and his dedicated staff for all their hard work on all of our behalf's.

In addition I want to recognize Janet Arkin, the director of the Price Family Preschool, for her tireless 23 years of dedication to our youngest children, and to their emotional, spiritual and educational growth. They are the future of our Temple Emanu El community.

Dear Temple Emanu-El Family,

With great wisdom our Jewish tradition teaches us that the reason we have to study the same texts over and over again, each in season at its appointed time, is not because the text will magically change since last year nor because we will forgot what we've studied, but rather, WE will have changed, and we will read the beloved old texts in an entirely new light. We will have gained hard-earned wisdom and new perspectives... some of them welcomed and others leaving us to wish we were still happily ignorant.



This has been such a year.

I would have been happy to live in ignorance my entire life of what it means to witness our people slaughtered, humiliated, degraded and dehumanized simply for being Jews. Simply for being.

I would have been happy to live in ignorance my entire life of what it means to watch a loud vocal minority openly embrace and extol Jew Hatred as a righteous cause. I would have been happy to live in ignorance my entire life of what it means to feel the particular loneliness that is the hand maiden of the silent or unconcerned majority who does not share the views of the vocal minority but who cannot be stirred to openly and publicly stand against the rising tide of chic hate.

I would have happily chosen ignorance of the grief and heart smothering worry that has become like an old worn in pair of flip flops that carry me around all-day, ever present and oh so familiar as part of my every-day life now.

But Jewish traditions teaches that everything is in balance and everything can be for a blessing if we allow it to transform ourselves and our world for the better.

This year, we learned just how important our Jewish community is. True, Covid already taught us this lesson, but this year, the world has reinforced it. Raising the next generation of our people who know it means to have strength, integrity, and courage in the face of such adversity, is a sacred obligation on all Jewish adults and one which is a blessing to have the privilege to fulfill.

Realizing the reality that Kol Yisrael aravim zeh v'xeh (that all of Israel is responsible for one another) is truly a blessing. Seeing the broad majority of our people come together in solidarity and love for one another has been one of the greatest blessings of my lifetime. Watching our people choose to stand together in solidarity and love across so many political, social, and ideological divides has been nothing short of a miracle. God willing we will never need such a terrible reminder to remember what we mean to one another.

Knowing that we are commanded to celebrate life's joys, even when our world is upside down, is a blessing of sacred time. Jewish tradition demands that even amidst our grief, worry and woe, we not allow ourselves to languish in anguish. This is why, even in the face of a horrific war, even in the face of popular and trendy Jew Hatred, we celebrate B'nai Mitzvah students, we dance at weddings, and we welcome new children into the covenant. Each simcha celebrated is a victory in the face of hate, and each celebration helps ensure that we will never allow our hearts to become embittered. As Torah teaches... "see this day I have put before you both life and death, blessing and curse. Therefore choose life that you and your children may live." This year has taught us that we must always choose life - an intentionally joyful life.

And of course, while I could have remained blissfully ignorant about the trurealities of newborn-no-sleep reality, I am unspeakably grateful for the incredible privilege of knowing what a blessing we have been given and why we must always fight to make the world a better place.

Thank you for the privilege of being your rabbi for these past 11 years.

Our new Cantorial Soloist, Michelle Jirkovsky, has enriched our students' education with her music programming. She has run a youth choir, who have periodically throughout the year, performed in services and holiday observances. She also led our musical theater program which successfully put on a Hanukkah play and Esther, the Musical. The production values and performances were strong and professional, and we are excited for the growth of our program through camp and future performances.

As we wrap up the year, we also know that there will be a lot of transition in our Torah School in the year ahead. After 21 years, our Torah School Administrator, Star Laddon, is retiring. We thank her for her incredible service to our synagogue through the years. Her endeavors have made the Torah School the fun, welcoming, and vibrant place that it is today. Though no one can truly replace Star, we will carry on, always striving for the same level of excellence as we bring on new staff and prepare for the new school year.

Overall this year has been a year of joy, meaning, and successes, big and small.

The Advocacy Committee is a nonpartisan group that works to educate, inspire, and mobilize Temple members. We advocate for social justice issues that reflect Jewish values and have a direct impact on San Diegans and the Jewish community. During the past year our efforts focused on combating antisemitism, working for environmental justice, voter engagement and gun violence prevention.

We sadly had to focus on the issue of antisemitism in San Diego. We supported the City Attorney's effort to make the leafleting of hate flyers against the law. That initiative has been taken to the State level by City council member Chris Ward. We will continue to support this effort. As part of our work on the issue of Climate Justice we joined forces with the San Diego Audubon Society. The speaker at our Limmud Hour at Yom Kippur was Andrew Meyers, of the Audubon Society. He shared with us some of the Society's initiatives. Temple Emanu-El became a partner with the Re-wilding of Mission Bay. Many community groups are working to reimagine Mission Bay for recreation and habitat restoration. The Audubon Society has been working hard with partners to increase the acreage going toward habitat restoration and carbon sequestration. Voter engagement continues to be an important issue for the committee. We have begun to work with high school students to make sure they register to vote when eligible and then vote in the upcoming election.

We have supported the efforts of San Diegans for Gun Violence Prevention with making phone calls and sending emails supporting their efforts on safe gun storage and other initiatives. All Jews are called to do Tikkun Olam (repair of the world).

Our goal is to make a positive impact on San Diego, the country and the world. We try to make it easy for the entire Temple community to be involved with our projects and our collections. The committee meets monthly on Zoom. We welcome new members and new ideas.

The Hunger Project at St. Vincent de Paul, which we partner with Congregation Beth Israel, just celebrated our 38-year anniversary. Temple Emanu-El has traditionally been responsible for most of the staffing on the first Sunday of each month, but volunteers are welcome to come any Sunday. This is a wonderful project for families, for students preparing for Bar/Bat Mitzvah, and for anyone who has even one Sunday morning available to help those people who most need our help. Donations to the Social Action Hunger Project Fund go directly to support this work.

Our Bagel Brigade volunteers deliver unsold bagels each Wednesday from Einsteins on Lake Murray to Rachels Women's Center downtown. We are proud that this project, which reduces food waste, continues each week without interruption. Our recipients at Rachels look forward to this special treat.

Our Mitzvah of the Month collections ask for specific items each month to be donated to local organizations. This year's collections included blankets and warm clothing during this cold and rainy winter, towels and linen for Basic Needs Center at City College, "preloved" kitchen items for Kitchens for Good, infant items for "Gently Hugged," school supplies, gift bag items for Meals on Wheels clients, and more. The High Holy Day Food Drive brought in over 5700 pounds of food for the Jewish Family Service Food Pantry, plus gift cards and cash donations. Our collections for Monarch School, which supports homeless and at risk children, topped 1,000 toiletry kits since we began the project.

In 1998, we were the very first Jewish group to march in the Pride Parade and have participated every July since then. In 2023, we received the Light of Pride Award, and Rabbi Devorah was the keynote speaker at the Light Up the Cathedral event the week prior to the Parade.

Our Safe Parking Dinners at Jewish Family Service have resumed, with volunteers providing food and serving at the Balboa site. More dinners are planned for the coming year. Donations to help this project are welcome and may be earmarked when donating to the Social Action Fund.

We are planning for another nonpartisan Proposition Seminar to be held this fall prior to the November elections to help voters make their best decisions and navigate the often-dense language. This has been well attended and helpful in past years.

Our financial subcommittee evaluates organizations to donate money from our Social Action Fund using stringent guidelines. Each year, we vote on the list of distributions for the following year, and also approve emergency allocations based on the same stringent guidelines. During the 2023-24 fiscal year, the committee approved donations to vetted organizations including Feeding America San Diego, Reading Legacies, Magen David Adom, World Central Kitchen, the Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, Yad Sarah, and the Jacobs and Cushman Food Bank. Information on the month's donation is included in every Temple bulletin.

Our committee organizes and promotes a diverse group of programs in our community to appeal to those of all ages, financial means, and physical abilities.

We look forward to working with you in the coming year.

ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE CHAIR: Dr. Bob Rubenstein

No meetings were held during this fiscal year.

The chairman of the committee, Dr. Bob Rubenstein attended Temple Finance Committee meetings through the year and advocated for contributions from the Temple general operating funds to augment Endowments.

The Temple held a fundraiser for the Torah School and Campership Endowment in April which has resulted in \$80,000 in contributions to that fund.

The chairman has advocated for a greater amount of available funds being transferred to Endowments to follow Rabbi Marcus's concept of greater long-term stability in order of serve all congregants as needed.

The Endowment and its subcommittee, the Investment Committee was reduced in size due to resignations and illness and is in the process of being reconstituted.

We thank Temple members for their contributions to these endowment funds which have increased in value by \$112,000, not including additional contributions by individual donors

SAFETY AND SECURITY COMMITTEE

Chair: Greg Houska

Purpose: To provide guidance and recommendations to Temple staff and the Executive Board on safety and security related procedures to assist in safeguarding Temple staff, students and congregants. Work closely with local law enforcement, and others, such as the SDPD, the San Diego Law Enforcement Coordination Center (LECC), which is San Diego's Regional Threat Assessment Center, the SD Federation's Secure Community Network (SCN), and the San Diego Chapter of the ADL.

Goals/Accomplishments: The Safety and Security Committee provides a link to the larger community of local law enforcement agencies, the Anti-Defamation League and other Jewish organizations. Together we share information, best practices in faith-based safety and security policies and provide a link that allows for a continuous assessment of vulnerabilities and calculated controls.

This year, we:

- Coordinated in-person SCN training for congregants related to identification and response to potential threats, how to conduct internal threat assessments, including "Stop the Bleed" first aid training. Approximately 60 congregants and guests attended.
- Received a \$10,000 High Holidays security grant from the SD Jewish Federation to help defray security related expenses.
- Attended ADL/SCN regional meetings as scheduled, representing Temple Emanu-El.
- Worked closely with Shaun Copans and our new security surveillance vendor to assess and update the Temple's security camera system, which now includes enhanced video quality, facial recognition and vehicle license identification capabilities.
- Conducted annual lockdown/fire evacuation with the Torah School and the Preschool.
- Provided guidance and assistance with Temple staff with preparations for High Holy Day Services.
- Created and submitted for Executive Director approval, Cal-OSHA's new Workplace Violence Prevention Plan that is effective 07/01/2024.
