

#### Next Group Meeting: Monday, September 16, 6:30 pm The Man Who Sold Air in the Holy Land



The Book Group will meet on Monday, September 16, at 6:30pm at a member's home near the Temple. I'm so intrigued by the book we chose—*The Man Who Sold Air in the Holy Land.* It's a collection of short stories by an Israeli author, Omer Friedlander, and it's gotten raves. From "a marvelous new voice" (Rebecca Makkai), these "extraordinarily imaginative" (Sigrid Nunez), "revelatory" (Nicole Krauss), "superb" (Kiran Desai) stories transcend borders as they render the intimate lives of people striving for connection.

The Man Who Sold Air in the Holy Land announces the arrival of a natural-born storyteller of immense talent. Warm, poignant, delightfully whimsical, Omer Friedlander's gorgeously immersive and imaginative stories take you to the narrow limestone alleyways of Jerusalem, the desolate beauty of the Negev Desert, and the sprawling orange groves of Jaffa, with characters that spring to vivid life. A divorced con artist and his daughter sell empty bottles of "holy air" to credulous tourists; a Lebanese Scheherazade enchants three young soldiers in a bombed-out Beirut radio station; a boy daringly "rooftops" at night, climbing steel cranes in scuffed sneakers even as he reimagines the bravery of a Polish-Jewish dancer during the Holocaust; an Israeli volunteer at a West Bank checkpoint mourns the death of her son, a soldier killed in Gaza.

These stories render the intimate lives of people striving for connection. They are fairy tales turned on their head by the stakes of real life, where moments of fragile intimacy mix with comedy and notes of the absurd. Told in prose of astonishing vividness that also demonstrates remarkable control and restraint, they have a universal appeal to the heart.

### Proposition Seminar for the November Election Wednesday, September 25, 6pm

If you are confused by the number and complexity of the propositions each election, you are not alone. If you want to be a knowledgeable voter, you should be congratulated. Our Social Action Committee is here to help.

We are fortunate that Jason Bercovitch has agreed to lead the presentation. Bercovitch is the District Director for Congressman Scott Peters, where he has been working since 2013, specializing in immigration, foreign affairs, financial services and outreach to local small businesses and faith-based communities. He is actively involved with the San Diego Jewish community, serving on committees at ADL, AJC and Jewish Family Service.

All registered voters will receive a mail ballot. Yours may not have arrived by the time of the Seminar, so be ready to take notes. This year, the program will be hybrid – both in person at the Temple and via Zoom. To ensure that we cover as much material as possible, all questions must be submitted in writing or by using the Zoom "chat" feature and may be combined if appropriate.

For planning purposes, we are asking that participants register in advance to attend, whether in person or online. All are welcome, whether they are or are not Temple members. Register through the Temple's weekly emails or through the website.

### Mental Health Committee – You Are Old! Be Happy! by Marie Raftery, Committee Chair

The New York Times recently had an article on Depression and Anxiety. It stated that both peaked in November of 2020 and that 42.6 percent of adults said they had symptoms according to Household Pulse Survey, a census bureau. Since that time, that figure has declined to 20.7 percent, which is still double the 11 percent of Americans who said the same thing before the pandemic.

The good news (from a point of view) is that for people in midlife or older this distress is actually declining. The Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System, a national survey, shows an unbroken upward trend. It also shows that age boosts mental health. While older people show declines in attention and memory, they gain more control over their emotions. Older people also learn to focus more on positive memories, called "gratifying memory distortion," regarding the past. I noticed my recollections on my kids' behavior as children improved as I grew older. Even my thoughts of the pandemic, while certainly not good, as time goes on, I seem to remember them not being that bad and do have some positive memories. The survey finds this somewhat paradoxical. The older the subjects were, the more positive memories even though they were more physically at risk. This puts young people at a disadvantage when facing traumatic events. And, if economic and political uncertainty rather than their fear of illness drove their stress, there is no reason to expect it to recede.

Who said there isn't a silver lining to getting old?

### Israel Engagement – Arts and Culture By Rhonda Amber and Jonathan Licht

Our State of Israel and Jewish Homeland has been in turmoil for the past few years. After a new coalition government was formed with significant right-wing elements in late 2022 there were attempts at a Judicial coup and counter demonstrations to preserve the Democracy. Then came October 7 with Hamas's massacre of 1200 of Israel's population and kidnapping of hostages, causing the Israeli-Gaza war. The results have been massive destruction and deaths in Gaza, and lesser but still devastating losses in Northern Israel, the West Bank and on the Lebanese border. Meanwhile expansion of settlements in the West Bank accelerated accompanied by violence between Palestinians and settlers. We have reached the tipping point between a truce in Gaza and a larger regional war.

When will Israel and her neighbors be safe and secure? Currently a hopeful vision for the day after is missing. What a difficult time in our history!

How do the people of Israel bring comfort, community and normalcy into their lives? As humans, we try to keep our faith, traditions, values, culture and identity alive during stressful, even existential times. Artists continue to create. New poetry, song, theater, performance, film, dance and other creative liturgy expands. Life and joy are core Jewish values. Resiliency is a feature of the Israeli society. Art and culture continue despite the disrupted society.

So yes, even during these times, probably especially at this time, Israelis and those of us in the Diaspora must develop and experience the arts, culture, music and community.

Rachel Korazim's lessons directly assist those in need since October 7 and enrich lives, including ours, here at Temple, this autumn.

Another example is the current exhibition in Tel Aviv described below:

"October Seventh - A Space of Anguish, Loss, Anger, Memory and Sorrow" at ANU – Museum of the Jewish People. This exhibition curates works by 25 artists whose creative activity reflects the atrocious times Israeli society is facing since October 7th. Some of them are living artists, some deceased – either murdered on October 7th or died during the ongoing war, while others are residents (or former residents) of the southern areas, who suffered the loss of their loved ones, their homes, or whose families were affected by the horrors of the massacre. The exhibition wishes to frame a current situation and to record the unique creative burst that is well felt among Israelis since the war began." (Neil Harris, Culture Vulture, July 30, 2024) Neil Harris intermittently publishes a newsletter called the "Culture Vulture," in which he explores the breadth and depth of Israel's current cultural scene. It's inspiring.

### Sponsorship Opportunities: Artisan Festival

For over twenty years, the Sisterhood has supported graduating high school seniors in our Temple community by providing a select number of students with scholarships that partially fund their college education. The Sisterhood raises money for these scholarships in several ways: through direct donations, fundraising events, and by allocating funds from our annual budget. Our principal fundraiser is the Artisan Festival, held on the first Sunday of November. The Festival showcases local artists who bring their wares and sell them to attendees. Historically, we have been able to generate approximately \$5,000 annually, which enables us to award multiple scholarships. We know, however, that this coming year we will have an unusually large graduating class. That, coupled with the rising costs of college, has inspired us to set a goal of raising \$10,000. To achieve this goal, we are looking for individuals and businesses willing to help sponsor our Artisan Festival. Sponsors will be recognized in all advertising for the Festival, which includes social media postings, our Temple bulletin, flyers that will reach 500 families in our congregation, and posters that appear in stores and libraries in the surrounding communities. 

In August, funds were sent to World Jewish Congress (worldjewishcongress.org), which began in 1936 in response to the growing anti-Semitism across Europe. The organization is now active in 100 countries, representing Jewish communities and organizations. ## Helping to Repair the World

## **Recovery International**

### "Nervous people don't like change and fear routine." (Dr. Abraham Low)

I have always liked to plan ahead and for things to go as planned, like what I'm making for dinner, or what I'm going to wear for a presentation, or controlling my temper during traffic.

In Recovery International, Dr. Low said that to stay well we need to do certain things. Over the next few months in my bulletin articles, I plan to discuss the main points of the Recovery International (RI) program. This includes:

-using the 4-Step Method.

-attending meetings.

-reading Recovery International literature.

RECOVERY

BETTER. MENTAL. HEALTH.\*\*

The 4-step method is the core of this program and of every RI support meeting. It's the meat and potatoes of the program.

In a group setting, whether participating in online or in-person meetings, we learn by listening to others and then practicing by volunteering. Volunteering can be reading a portion of the RI literature, giving a tool, or sharing an example.

Giving examples using this Method helps us to:

- report rather than complain
- note our symptoms
- check our responses
- control our behavior
- use the tools to change our thoughts
- see our progress
- praise ourselves for our efforts
- learn simplicity instead of complexity.

Identifying disturbing feelings, sensations, thoughts or impulses is called "spotting." This program teaches you how to recognize when you are worked up and apply RI tools or "spots" to control thoughts and impulses. Learning to "spot" your temper and symptoms is an important step in replacing negative (insecure) thoughts with positive (secure) thoughts. There are hundreds of tools or "spots" to help you manage the events that get you worked up.

We are lucky to have an in-person RI meeting in the Temple Library every Thursday at 10am. Walk-ins are welcome!

#### Community Corner Practicing Groundedness by Gail L. Braverman, M.A., LMFT

What comes to mind when you think of groundedness?

Here is one definition: Groundedness is unwavering internal strength and confidence that sustains you through ups and downs. It is stability through change and even chaos.

The Coronavirus ravaged the globe, leaving significant human and economic destruction in its wake. It disrupted how we work, play, love, grieve and participate in our communities. We all discovered that life was not as stable as we thought or would have liked it to be.

That is where the problem is. Our culture urges us to seek stability, but doesn't reflect the reality that change is constant. However, with the right skills, change can be a dramatic force for growth.

Embracing life's uncertainty, instability and changeability turns out to be empowering and even comes with benefits.

People tend to respond to change in one of four ways: They attempt to avoid or refuse to acknowledge it, they actively resist it, they relinquish control, or they try to get back to where they were before an event happened.

I suggest six practices of groundedness to help support you during times of change, loss and "lifequakes." Practice is the repeated exercise of a skill in order to gain proficiency. In order to obtain groundedness, I suggest practicing the following:

- 1. Accept where you are to get to where you need to go. In order to get where you want to be, you need to see clearly where you are now.
- 2. **Be Present** so you can use your attention and energy, both physically and mentally, to work for what you want to achieve, not getting stuck in thoughts about the past or future.
- 3. Be **Patient** and you'll get there faster. Give things time and space to unfold.
- 4. Embrace **Vulnerability** to develop genuine strength and confidence. Show up authentically and be your real self with others.
- 5. Build Deep Community Nurture genuine connection and belonging.
- 6. Move Your Body so you fully inhabit it and become more comfortable in your own space.

When life breaks us open, and it will, we can also be grounded and fall down without falling apart. We can gain confidence, competence and compassion for yourself and others.

Reflection: When in the past have you fallen down and what skills did you use to get back up?

**Today's Practice:** Today I will practice one of the skills I have learned in order to be more prepared when life surprises me.

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### Safety/Security Committee

#### by Greg Houska, Safety/Security Committee Chair

I often receive well meaning and insightful questions regarding our Temple's security. This month, I devoted my column to presenting the matrix we use to evaluate our institution's security protocols.

The foundation of effective security starts with a thorough risk assessment to identify potential threats. Temple staff and the Security Committee constantly evaluate both internal and external risks in context with the Temple's location, visitor traffic and historical security issues. We regularly conduct security audits to evaluate and ensure that the security protocols remain up-to-date and effective against emerging threats.

The newly installed and enhanced video surveillance technology is a powerful tool in enhancing Temple security. High -resolution cameras at key entry points, around the perimeter, and inside the Temple provide valuable evidence if incidents occur and also act as a deterrent to possible threats. Access control systems and entry logs ensure that only authorized individuals can enter restricted areas. We have also worked on issues relating to fences, gates and secure entry doors. Current plans include discussions with the City on placing fencing around the parking lot. Protecting sensitive information from cyber threats has become more difficult and more important. Thank goodness we have smart people working on this problem!

Our security has been greatly enhanced by hiring trained security personnel who understand the cultural and religious significance of the Temple. One only has to speak with Kurtis Ramsey or one of his fellow security guards to understand the importance of this.

In concert with the Jewish Federation, Secure Community Network and other Jewish organizations, we have put into place training sessions for staff and volunteers on security protocols, emergency response procedures and identifying suspicious behavior. Developing and regularly updating emergency response plans, including evacuation procedures and first aid protocols, ensures that the Temple is ready to handle crises efficiently. Conducting periodic drills with staff and volunteers helps in reinforcing these procedures.

Building strong relationships with local law enforcement and emergency services enhances overall security. Regular communication and coordination with these agencies ensure a swift response. Next time you see a first responder, make sure you say, "thank you!"



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
